

SHORTS

here is a **lot** of interest in **DMR radio**, recently. For those who don't know what that is, it's yet another digital voice mode that sounds like a hive of angry bees on an FM radio. But to a DMR radio, it opens the door to digital voice communications. Based on Motorola's "MOTOTRBO" modulation scheme, it's just another proprietary digital voice entry in our *very* long list...

What is bound to make it popular, though, is the price of admission to the DMR club is very inexpensive. A good quality 5-watt DMR handheld, the TYT MD-380 is going for under \$100, and it is a very capable and well-built radio.

D igital Voice Repeaters are about to become more popular in the near future, and for the same reason DMR is taking off, namely **PRICE**!

For under \$200, repeater sponsors can add digital voice capability to their existing FM repeaters, without losing FM operation! The add-on equipment to do this uses a Raspberry-pi computer, an Arduino controller and a custom made repeater controller board that can be installed in a matter of minutes.

The end result is a repeater that can accommodate FM, DMR, P25, NXDN **and** D-STAR! Additionally, full network operation is possible if there is an Internet connection at the repeater site.

These are exciting times, indeed!
